

You are in the "at risk" group if you are aged 65 or over or have:

- Diabetes
- Chronic heart disease
- Chronic kidney disease
- Chronic liver disease
- Weakened immune system
- Severe asthma (on a preventative steroid inhaler) or chronic respiratory disease
- Transplant patient
- Spleen removal
- All pregnant women
- Carers
- Chronic neurological disease (such as Parkinson's disease, motor neurone disease, stroke and transient ischaemic attacks)

Children aged between 6 months and 13 years old and who are in the "at risk" group WILL REQUIRE AN APPOINTMENT.

All 2, 3 & 4 year olds are now eligible but will also need to make an appointment.

Please telephone 01449 776000 to make an appointment.

If you are not in the "at risk" group, or not a patient of Stowhealth, private flu vaccines are available at £10.00 per vaccine. Please attend the Walk In Clinics on the above dates.

From the Rectory

YOU ARE WHAT YOU EAT, some will have us believe, and as with so much that is said there is an element of truth. No one seriously suggests that too much chocolate turns us into chocolate, or too many sprouts into a sprout but all have their effect on our bodies – if not our minds.

For several weeks our Gospel readings have focused on Jesus' saying 'I am the bread of Life', with the suggestion that we might *eat of him* through regular receipt of the Holy Communion and so thereby become more like him. Leaving aside the theological disputes concerning the nature of the bread of Holy Communion as it is received following blessing, one important point comes to mind. The receipt of the bread at Holy Communion is almost never undertaken without hearing a reading from the Gospels, prayers and quite possibly another reading from the Bible and some address to go with it.

It is rare to read the chocolate wrapping, and sprouts don't have any advice – we are simply physically fed by them, but as we receive the bread of Holy Communion, however we interpret it, our minds are also fed by scripture, a thought or two and an opportunity through prayer to make it our thought as well.

If we only listen to what we already know or read what we expect we will approve of our minds are not being fed and there is the danger they will stagnate and not develop at all. Do you want that?

ARE YOU WHAT YOU READ?

Dare I suggest a different newspaper or website or a trip to church or a Bible? **Sunday 25 October** is Bible Sunday and I am hoping our services that day will have a flavour of what I regard as the greatest book ever compiled.

I am pleased that seven more adults from these parishes will be **Confirmed** at Stowmarket on 13 September at 4pm. Please join Rachel and me with them if you can to show support.

The darker nights are calling indoor activities... September marks the beginning of the academic year and learning begins for many. Our Diocesan **Growing In God** material is being looked at in many churches. If you would like to be involved please let me know.

Help prevent falls and trips

Don't underestimate the consequences of an older person having a fall. A fall can result in broken hips or bones and even early death. In addition to the pain and distress a fall can cause, it can take away someone's self-confidence, leaving them afraid to go out and socially isolated. The statistics on falls are staggering:

- 50% of people aged over 80 suffer a fall each year
- 33% of people aged over 65 suffer a fall each year
- 1 in 10 elderly falls result in serious injury
- 25% of all 999 calls are falls related

One way of reducing the chance of falling is by replacing old and worn slippers. Many people have a favourite pair of comfy slippers that could be potentially dangerous. Worn soles can easily lead to a slip and slippers that fit poorly can cause a trip. The safest slippers are those with good quality non-slip rubber soles, are enclosed and have a fastener. So, if you have a pair of old and worn slippers, please think about replacing them. And if you've got an elderly friend or relative think about giving them an early Christmas present of a new pair of slippers.

It's almost time for a flu vaccination

GPs are encouraging people in at-risk groups to start thinking about getting their winter flu jab. From September GP practices will be contacting patients in at-risk groups, informing them of their entitlement to a free NHS flu vaccination. For your convenience many GP practices will be operating walk- in flu clinics.

At risk-groups entitled to a free NHS flu vaccination from their GP:

- You are aged 65 years or over
- You are pregnant
- You are living in a long-stay residential care home
- You are the carer of an elderly or disabled person whose welfare may be at risk if you fall ill
- You are a child aged 2—4 years
- You are aged six months to 65 years and have a heart problem; a chest complaint or breathing difficulties; a kidney disease; lowered immunity due to disease or treatment (such as steroid medication or cancer treatment); a liver disease; had a stroke or TIA; diabetes; a neurological condition e.g. multiple sclerosis; a problem with, or removal of, their spleen e.g. sickle cell disease.

If you are someone in an at risk group, or know someone who is, please don't underestimate how serious flu can be. A serious case of flu could result in bronchitis or pneumonia, a worsening of your diabetes and for pregnant women premature labour or even stillbirth.







Dial-a-Ride services in Suffolk

What is Dial-a-Ride?

Dial-a-Ride is a local door to door transport service, using easy access minibuses. Each minibus has low steps, handrails and a lift for wheel-chair access. There are now services across most of Suffolk, run by voluntary organisations and funded by the County Council. Dial-a-Ride is available to anyone who cannot access conventional bus services because of where they live or mobility difficulties.

How do I use Dial-a-Ride?

Dial-a-Ride services enable passengers to travel locally, for example to visit friends and relatives, go to the rail station or take a trip to the shops. Journeys require advance booking and are allocated on a first call, first served basis. The fare is similar to ordinary bus services.

A little about our new curate Rachel Cornish. She writes

'Before moving to this part of Suffolk and the seven parishes which form our two benefices, I spent just over the last 10 years living in Felixstowe. I was licensed as a Reader in the autumn of 2009 and was ordained deacon in the summer of 2014. I was born and grew up in Cambridge moving to Felixstowe in 2004 with my husband Pete. We hoped to open a Nightshelter in Ipswich and although we never achieved this, both my late husband and I worked with homeless and marginalised people in Ipswich and Felixstowe. I managed a day centre for homeless and marginalised people in the centre of Ipswich until 2012. Before moving to Suffolk I had a long career with the John Lewis Partnership, mostly on the personnel side, and for the last four years before moving worked full time as a paid member of staff in Jimmy's Nightshelter in Cambridge.

I am the youngest of a family of five, my sister who is the oldest in the family lives in France and my three brothers live in Norfolk and London.

Despite all the challenges of moving to a part of Suffolk I did not know before, I am thoroughly enjoying all the changes in life that the recent move has brought about. In Felixstowe I lived close to Marks & Spencer and have had no car since 2009 when Pete died. The last time I lived in the countryside was in my childhood so life is now very different, but nevertheless it is full of blessings'.

And I know that Rachel will be welcomed in all our communities. The 'lights' or lack of in Onehouse are very different to Felixstowe, but the communities here are no less warm. Her Ordination in the Cathedral was an intensely moving ceremony both for Rachel and our new Bishop, Martin. I am delighted she is here to work with me and the Ministry Team to support the work of the churches and strengthen community. There is a huge amount going on.







Buxhall & Shelland Fête







Following on from our previous 'read the book, watch the film' event we decided to tackle 'The Shipping News'. This is a film I have watched several times and I never get bored of it. I love the actors (Kevin Spacey, Judy Dench, Cate Blanchett...who would have thought that she could play a slutty character so well?), I love the music and the story.

The tale is about a man called Quoye (played by Spacey); damaged by his upbringing and who is constantly getting knocked flat by life. But when he hooks up with his aunt (Dench) and moves to back of beyond (Newfoundland) he finds he has got the skills and the resilience to tackle life head on. Of course, he ends up getting the girl played by another awesome actress Julianne Moore.

In the book of course, the characters are not nearly so photogenic as the actors mentioned above. A lot of time was spent at the beginning of the story going over how completely hopeless the Spacey character was...so much so that several book clubbers hadn't got far beyond the first few chapters. It was pretty depressing reading. I only kept going because I knew the basics of the story from the film.

Those of us that persisted with the book got the distinct impression that Newfoundland was inhabited by child abusers with a morbid fascination for car wrecks. The dreary weather also had a starring role; it is always either foggy, raining or snowing. On the upside there was a running theme on different types of knots which, as the skill to tie them was mastered, reflected how Quoye was mastering taking charge and responsibility for his own life. There was fair bit of humour as well, although this came out much better in the film than in the book.

Apart from watching the film and talking about the book we were also able to sample a fair range of different types of gin (thanks Pauline) and consume delicious 'Nigella' inspired 'Lemon Polenta' cake (thanks Steve).

Our next project is to read through some of the books listed for the 'New Angle' prize. This is for books which have East Anglia as the setting or as an important theme....



Buxhall Parish Council: Proposed Conservation Area

It has been suggested that the Parish Council look into the viability of creating a Conservation Area to cover some of Mill Road, Finborough Road and Brettenham Road. The proposed area is shown on the map:



It is thought that these areas of the village hold a special interest for their historic value and exceptional character and may warrant the protection that a Conservation Area designation might bring.

Conservation Area Appraisals give an overview of the history and development of each area and try to define what it is that makes them special. They also identify specific features which contribute towards their character, for example, historic buildings and buildings which are locally significant, important green and open spaces, significant views, natural elements such as trees, and features which help make an area locally distinctive. They also identify elements that could be improved.

Designation of a conservation area is made locally and in order to make a decision Mid Suffolk District Council will need to justify such status by following the recommendations within the National Planning Policy Framework that demand that an area should have a definite architectural quality or historic interest and character or appearance which it is desirable to preserve or enhance, we will need to prove that we have all these.

Individual buildings can contribute positively to the character or appearance of the area and those that are distinctive, because they are rare or unique, can be highlighted but it is the area rather than the individual properties that will warrant protection by a Conservation Area designation. Protection for individual houses is already established via their grade listings. A Conservation area is aimed at protecting buildings that are not listed and looks towards the "historic core" of a village as an "area".

Conservation Area designation introduces controls over the way owners living within the boundaries of the area can alter or develop their properties. This can put additional pressure on residents who wish to make changes to their property even very minor ones, however, these controls can also be beneficial because they sustain, and/or enhance, the value of their property within it. These controls include:

- the requirement in legislation and national planning policies to preserve and/or enhance
- control over demolition of all buildings not just listed ones.
- control over works to trees
- restrictions on advertising
- restriction on the types of development which can be carried out without the need for planning permission (permitted development rights).
- Requirement to have Conservation Area status recorded as a local Land Charge.
- Need permission before alterations such as cladding, inserting windows, installing satellite dishes and solar panels, adding conservatories or other extensions, laying paving or building walls. Cutting down a tree or doing any pruning work. **Demolition** of any building, garage, shed or house.

Conservation Area status WILL NOT prevent new development, but it will control demolition of buildings to ensure anything of value is kept and will control the appearance of any new build, whether extension of existing or stand alone new build. Any designation of a Conservation Area will not protect an area from new building unless it can be proved that the changes will erode its character and to get the designation we will have to prove its character is worth protecting.

It may well be possible to get a new Conservation Area designated for Buxhall, and it will probably be welcomed by council planners and heritage officers, however it will need extensive work, research and persuasion and the first step for the Parish Council is to make sure it is something that residents want.
